

The TCRC Annual Auction February 1st

The biggest R/C Airplane Auction in the Upper Midwest -- the TCRC Annual Auction -- will be held on Saturday, February 1st, at its normal there will be a concession stand location of CrossPoint Church at the intersection of 98th Street and France Avenue in Bloomington, Minnesota.

If you are planning on being a seller at the TCRC Auction, you can preregister at TCRCOnline.com. Instructions for pre-registration are on page Remember there is a minimum opening bid 3 of this newsletter. requirement of \$20, so sellers are urged to bundle lower priced items to be well above the \$20 opening. If the seller check-in people do not believe an item will achieve the minimum bid, they may require that item to be sold on the bargain table during the auction.

If you are a buyer, you will have several different means to purchase R/C airplanes and equipment: 1) By bidding on items continually coming across the main stage from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM; 2) By bidding on select items in a silent auction throughout the course of the day; and 3) By visiting the bargain table for R/C items priced between \$15-\$30.

Doors open at 6:45 AM for seller registration and check in, and for from sales very soon after the auction. buyer registration. There is a \$5 admission charge for everyone attending the auction. A Bidder's Card is included in the admission charge.

At 8:15 AM the impound area will be opened to give the bidders a chance to get close-up looks at the items that will be sold. In addition, all items heading for the auction block will proceed down tables in the auction hall. This process and flow of items will generally take about 45 minutes to go across these tables. Again, giving potential buyers a chance to see their interested item for auction bidding.

If you are a seller and you feel your item is selling for too low of a price, you may protect that item by being the winning bidder. In that case,

you will be charged a buyback fee of 10% of the selling price up to a maximum of \$20. On successful sales. TCRC auction takes а commission of \$5 or 10% of the selling price, whichever is greater, on all items.

Throughout the course of the day, starting with coffee and rolls in the morning. and sandwiches and beverages for the rest of the day. Patrons must stay in the concession area (which is on the main auction floor) while eating and drinking. No food or beverage is allowed outside of this area, including carry-ins.

For buyers, TCRC accepts cash, checks and credit cards. If a credit card is used a 3% fee will be charged. All items must be paid for and removed by the end of the auction.

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Three nice planes showed up at the December membership meeting.



Sherwood Heggen yet again had a plane from yesteryear at the meeting. He had a Sig Kougar, at one time a staple in every pilot's fleet. He purchased the Kougar partially built from an estate. Sherwood completed the plane adding the tail and turtle deck, radio, engine and finish work. The Kougar weighed in at 6-pounds and had a wingspan of 50-inches. It was powered by a Super Tigre 51 2-stroke engine. The covering was yellow Silkspan with white trim. Sherwood said on its maiden flight, it flew as a Kougar is expected to fly – very well.

Scott Anderson had a nifty little Me-262 Swallow ARF from Horizon Hobby. (See the photo to the top right.) He said the 262 had electric ducted fans supplied and was a bind-and-fly kit. The wingspan was 20-inches and weighed in at a whopping 9.8 ounces. The fans were 30 mm powered with a 3S-600 mah 30C flight battery. It was done in German camouflage colors. He said the small model was a nice change of pace from his 1/3-scale and ¼-scale planes he has been flying. He has flown it at Jordan and says it performs smoothly on take-offs and landings. He gets about a 6minute flight time grom the battery.



Brian Crossley had an electric A-10 Warthog at the meeting from Radical RC. Actually, Radical RC doesn't make an A-10. Instead, they make an upgrade kit. Brian bought two GWS Slow Sticks (needed two rudder/fins) and then used the upgrade to make his A-10. It was done in military green and powered by twin ducted fans. He had to add twin rudder/fins, brackets for the ducted fans, trike gear and working ailerons. He also added a dummy 'big gun' in the nose. He said the plane does indeed fly. He said it was a bit underpowered, but he was afraid that if he added more power the plane might break up in flight! He does fly it at least once a year. He takes off, does a few laps around the circuit and then lands. \odot

2024-2025 AMA Dues Statements

Most older TCRC members should have received their 2024-2025 dues statements in the mail in the month of November from the Academy of Model Aeronautics. Newer members renew on the anniversary of the month they joined.

AMA 2025 dues are the same as the previous year. They are:

- Adult (19-65) \$85
- Senior (65 and up) \$75
- Under 19 Free or \$15 with *MA*

Your AMA membership gives you \$2.5 million in personal liability coverage, \$25,000 in medical coverage and also a subscription to either the print or digital *Model Aviation* for the year.

To belong to TCRC, you must have a valid membership for the year in AMA.

Please note that AMA also has a Park Pilot membership that has a cost of \$38 per year, but that membership is not valid for membership in TCRC.

To renew your membership in AMA, the Academy gives you four methods: at the AMA website, <u>www.modelaircraft.org</u>; by phone at (765) 287-1256; or by returning the renewal form you received in the mail in the supplied envelope.

Deadline for paying your 2025 AMA dues is December 15 to avoid a lapse in membership services. ©

Fairey Fantôme

The December Mystery Plane was the Belgium Fairey Fantôme. Fantôme in Belgium means 'ghost'.



Considered by many aviation designers to be aesthetically the most attractive fighting biplane. It was built in 1934 for the Belgium Air Force.

This plane first flew in June 1935. It was of all-metal construction with fabric-covered control surfaces. Provision was made for a 20 mm cannon, and 4-50 caliber Browning machine guns. The first machine crashed in July, but the manufacturer had enough spare parts for three more planes, and those parts-now-planes completed fight tests, and all were accepted.

These planes were ordered by Russia, Spain and Britain. Now, although the plane was very successful, no production followed. One has to wonder why?

One of the planes served in 1941 in the Western desert with the English Royal Navy.

The Fairey Fantôme had a wingspan of 34-feet 6-inches, a loaded weight of 4,120 pounds and a cruising speed of 270 mph. It was powered with a Hispano-Suiza 12-cylinder inline engine that developed 920 horsepower.





The Addiction

I had heard of this organization but never knew anyone who had used it. But here I am on the advice (demand) of my wife and the minister of my church. I didn't think I was hurting anyone. It was all very innocent. So, here I am at this meeting, and it was my turn to introduce myself. I stood and heard my self say, "Hi, my name is Chuck Benson. I am a balsaholic and I need help. There was comforting relief in just saying those few words. I was now officially a member of Balsa Anonymous.

Where did this all start? One never knows the exact time when something like this starts. My father messed around with a little wood model airplane for a while but then he found the game of golf. I didn't see him around on weekends much after that. A buddy of mine in high school found an old control line engine in his folk's garage that his dad had tried to run when he was younger. My buddy built a control line airplane from a kit for the engine, crashed it, and gave up on the idea of model airplanes. He said I could have the airplane, so I took it. It needed some repair which I found interesting. I was handy in making things and a local hobby shop sold balsa which I needed for making new ribs and such. I had never felt a piece of sheet balsa before. It had a soft, light, and pleasant feel. The fragrance was lightly sharp and woody which penetrated my liking. An old card table sufficed for a work bench. I picked up a wing tip block and felt its warm, smooth, and friendly texture. Other parts in the box seemed to want to be touched. I had to take it home to the bedroom workshop. It cost most of the money I had, but cost was no object at that point.

Later at home in my bedroom workshop I opened the box and absorbed the alluring fragrance of balsa. An airplane was to be built from the box's contents which urged me on to work the balsa. It was easy to cut, sand, and fit into the proper place to create the end result. Eventually, an airplane was in front of me. I loved the sight of the finished structure with its little wings stretched out begging "Fly Me". To realize flight, an engine, radio, and support equipment were required. Money to buy the support equipment purchase was earned by doing odd jobs after school and weekends. When school homework was finished, the balsa called me back to the bedroom workshop to enjoy its pleasure. I liked what I heard and found many sources on the Internet for beautiful scale models that were precisely detailed like the real thing. It was amazing that one could own such an incredible looking model with no work involved. I ordered two models -- one was a Piper Cub and the other a Corsair with retracts! Three days later, their box arrived at my doorstep. I carefully opened the box and beheld two highly detailed foam scale models. All I had to do to make them flight ready was to charge the battery, bind the receiver to my transmitter, and go fly.

The following day was sunny and calm and perfect for a test hop of the Cub. All went well. I was flying again! I had missed that part of the hobby but now was back into it. Many flights took place over the next few days with both the Cub and the Corsair. Eventually, the Cub and Corsair developed a lot of hangar rash and some crash damage repair and weren't looking as good as new. It was time to see what else was out there that would be nice to have. Big Time Hobby was having a 30% off sale on WWII fighters at the right time for my need for new. I figured if I bought three, it would be a savings as if I had only bought two -- so the purchase was made. With their soon arrival, I was back in business with great looking models. The Cub and Corsair sat in the corner of the

workshop while the new ones got all of the flying time. That Christmas, my kids gave me a new and improved version of ready to fly foam airplanes. The skin was smooth, not bumpy looking like my other models, and it was much bigger which gave it smoother flight. I was infatuated with the foam airplanes. How easy it was to gain new planes with only the clicks of a few computer keys and then see the boxes show up at my front door. Much wanted more and I was beginning to wonder – how many is too many? I love them all!
