Model Aviation Day Was A Great Showcase For R/C

Another Model Aviation Day (MAD) is in the books. The weather, as usual, did not want to cooperate. It was a nice, clear day with sustained winds of 12-15 mph but very fickle in direction. It was observed that flyers would take off one direction, into the wind, and land the opposite direction - again, into the wind. But that didn't stop more than 35 people and over 60 planes from making it out to the event. There were twenty plus members and around 15 guests who made it out, including a family of five and another family of a mom and her son and his two friends. There were five non-club member pilots throughout the day.

The event started with a pilot's meeting at 9:50. In addition, there was a tentative schedule announced that included paintball at 11:00, lunch at 11:30 and the airplane giveaway at 12:00 - more on that in a later paragraph. There was a nice selection of 70s music on the PA system the entire day and Bob Briesemeister fired up the grill about 11:30.

Some of the aircraft at the event were multiple Corsairs, some trainer and stunt planes, like Thaddeus' highly aerobatic Ag Wagon, two Japanese warbirds, a couple of Cubs, and a WITCH! Yes, Jim Ronhovde brought out his Witch and flew her around, even in the relatively strong winds. He had some engine issues which caused a bad landing, but we've been assured that the Witch will fly again.

The paintball target was Brian Johnson's .40-size PT-19. He's always complained that he didn't like the way the plane flies and has tried to shorten its lifespan on multiple occasions to no avail. The author can attest to the bad flight performance of the plane as he flew it when Brian wanted to have a couple shots at it. We had 10 people shoot at the plane in the first round of paintball and had multiple hits on it, including one right through the side of the fuselage where the pilot would sit. This will be the last meeting-atthe-field for 2023. In October we will resume our indoor meetings at CrossPoint Church in Bloomington, MN.


In case of bad weather the meeting will be at its normal time of 7:00 PM at CrossPoint Church in Bloomington.

This past month there were two big giant-scale warbird events. One was in Oct. 10 Owatonna and then a week later the same thing happened in Fond du Lac, Wisconsin.

The engine was running on the flight stand and being adjusted up and down for settings and when in full power the prop came off and flew out to the fence at the flight line. No one was hurt, only very surprised. This may have had a very bad outcome had anyone been out in front of that engine. So, make sure the prop is tight and no one is in front at this time of adjustment.

Another thing to watch out for is in battery life or condition, so always make sure yours are charged and have not set for long time as that can be a problem and it may be that they have to be replaced.

Now, I want you all to talk to all other pilots that are flying with you so that everyone knows what the other maybe doing or going to do such as landing, touch-and-goes, going around again, and all other things that can cause an accident.

Consolidated Vultee XP-81

The August Mystery Plane was the Consolidated Vultee XP-81.



Conceived as a long-range escort fighter, combining turboprop with turbojet power was on the drafting table in January 1944. A single-seat fighter, it was to have a 2,300 horsepower turboprop, and a 3,750 horsepower turbojet – one for cruise, and one for high speed. Two were ordered, the first flying in February 1945, but with a RR 1,650 horsepower piston engine, since neither of the proposed engines were ready yet.

The plane, with the Merlin showed very good handling, and 13 preproduction planes were ordered. The intension was to continue testing, but with the 2,000 horsepower turbo installed, tests did not commence until December 1945. However, the 3,750 turbo did not provide more than 1,400 bhp. The XP-81 failed to meet any of the specifications.

The airplane was very complicated, heavy, and provided no more fighter capacity than proven planes from WWII, such as the P-51, P-47, Spitfire, etc., etc. By then, the contract had been cancelled. A great many bucks spent.

The Vultee had a wingspan of 50-feet 7-inches, a normal combat weight of 19,500 pounds and an expected speed of 478 mph. The two turbo engines had roughly 6,050 shaft horsepower.




TCRC Fall Float Fly
